
UPUMC volunteers stepped up again this year to serve the PT summer program as Reading Buddies at Walnut Hill UMC. They

Summer 2022 has seen quite a growth spurt for the UP Academy. Mark Parker took on the mantle of Chancellor, overseeing and guiding Academy initiatives, and sharing his wisdom and insights in writing (see cover page!). The School of Essential Wisdom summer sessions have been very well attended, and the catered lunches a big hit.

UP Legacy launched a 6-week course, "Legacy 101," during which students learned how to write an Ethical Will, a Spiritual Will, and a Wisdom Will. Dede provided a wealth of resources and advice stimulating students to reflect on their life experiences, as well as helpful frameworks for communicating their important messages to loved ones. Participants reflected, wrote enthusiastically, and shared examples of their work. At the end of the sixth week, several wondered if "Legacy 201" might be offered later in the year.
