# Colin M. Craft Minister of Youth/Families

Colin Craft certainly knows how to pack a lot of milestones into half a year. In early September, he took up his post as Minister of Youth and Families at UPUMC. On November 12, he preached a sermon in worship in our sanctuary. Then, on November 16, Emerson Andrew Craft was born, and Colin became a dad! With Emerson in tow, Colin started his "last first day" of seminary at Perkins on January 19. Three days later, the North Texas Conference's Board on Ordained Ministry referred him for commissiong as a provisional elder. And on the evening of February 18 Colin preached the sermon at the inaugural Upper Room Service in UPUMC's newly dedicated Youth Center.

Colin's family is from Irving, Texas, where he was born and educated in neighborhood public schools. Inspired by his grandfather Cecil Craft, he studied architecture in MacArthur High School's Career and Technical Education program. He met Macy Story when she came to MacArthur in the fall of his senior year. They dated through the end of high school, finding they had a lot in common, especially their devotion to God and their desire to serve. Both chose colleges in Abilene.

Macy studied at Hardin-Simmons, majoring in Biblical Studies and minoring in Biblical Languages. She is now serving as Director of Children's Ministries at First United Methodist Church of Arlington. Colin had felt a call to ministry already at the age of fifteen. He attended McMurry University where he majored in Religion and minored in Philosophy and Biblical Greek. After graduation from McMurry, Colin was Director of Young Adult Ministries at FUMC Irving. He then served as Director of Family Ministries at Vista Ridge UMC in Lewisville before joining the UPUMC staff.



Colin is a person who values teaching and learning. He gave me a book recommendation before I even started asking him questions about his history. (Beverly Roberts Gaventa: *Our Mother, St. Paul*). Later, he named several professors and authors from whom he has learned much during his Master of Divinity studies. Notable examples were a couple of Perkins professors, Dr. Priscilla Pope-Levison, Research Professor of Practical Theology, and her husband, Dr. Jack Levison, Chair of

Old Testament Interpretation and Biblical Hebrew.



When asked what he sees as his role as Minister of Youth and Families here at UPUMC, Colin answered that his mission is two-fold: to love the youth and teach them about the love of God, and to inspire them to be good people in the world. With such a clear vision for his ministry and a thoughtful, inspired faith, it is clear that Colin Craft is already becoming a wonderful shepherd for his flock, and a blessing to us all.



#### United Women in Faith Presentation:

### Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women and The Native American Boarding School System






Mickey's program was to educate UWF members about the "human rights crisis" indigenous women face today. Recent statistics reflect the current plight of Native American and Alaskan Native women in the United States:

- 4 out of 5 are affected by violence;
- murder is the 3rd leading cause of death (10X higher than all other ethnicities);
- in 2022, there were 5,487 incidents of missing women/girls (an increase of nearly 300 over 2021).

In 2017, two Senators from Montana introduced a resolution recognizing May 5 as a National Day of Awareness for Missing and Murdered Native Women and Girls (also called "Red Dress Day").

The Native American Boarding School System was created in 1819. Between 1860 and 1978, there were 375 schools in 30 U.S. states or territories. The purpose of these schools was to eliminate traditional indigenous ways of life and replace them with mainstream American culture. As a result of activism and legislation in the 1970's, most Native American boarding schools were shut down over the following two decades. By 2020, seven schools were still government funded; three of those are managed by Native Americans.
